Atlas established the Fisher Venture Grants program in January 2008 to recognize and assist think tanks that represent "great investments" for the future of liberty. Grantees are younger institutes with a track record that suggests a strong potential for improving the climate of ideas among their target audience.

Each of the five institutes receives \$100,000 over a three-year term, during which time Atlas will be in frequent contact to help develop plans and to monitor performance. Half of the grant is structured as a "matching program," providing strong incentive for think tanks to attract new local supporters for their important work.
